Such emotionally depressed students are selected and were given counseling so that the girls feel free to express all their hurdles to their respective faculty of their tutor ward to overcome any issues that come their way.

The Practice: Each week 15-20 students were allotted per staff to trace out the problems in their personality that hinders their excellence to shine in academics and social activities. We have found out students who had poor family background in a financially and psychologically disturbed state, girls who are pessimistic and aggressive. Topics like importance of parenting, education, love ,charity Friendship, dress coding, women's issues, women's

		harassment, cell phone importance were highlighted for this academic year.

		Students were distracted from their common norms of issues by encouraging
